BAND GOES TO OMAHA AS FEATURE OF CARNIVAL.

IS NOW ON BUSINESS BASIS

Chancellor Authorizes Playing for Remuneration—Fifty Men Chosen After Last Tryout This Fall.

Twenty-five band men left with Director Cornell last night to take part in the annual electrical parade of the Ak-Sar-Ben in Omaha. Almost the entire bunch were second and third-year band men, and an extremely good impression will be given of the ability of the Nebraska Cadet Band. This trip has been made for the last four years at the request of Omaha business men. Not only does it give the band a statewide reputation, but it also advertises the University in a favorable manner. In addition to these benefits this trip generally places the band on a sound financial basis for the remainder of the year.

The trip will be made this year with the full consent of the University authorities and on the band's responsibility. For, by a decision of Chancellor Avery, the University band has been made a commercial organization and may play for remuneration when and where it will, provided it plays at a uniform rate. The efforts at making money by the band men have on previous occasions placed the officials of the University in rather trying situations, but now, by the order of the head of the school, the band is on a strictly business basis.

In making this decision, however the Chancellor stated that in playing engagements it could not be partial, that it could not play at one price for one engagement and for another at a second.
