FOUR CANDIDATES FOR OXFORD

Rhodes Scholarship Examinations Are Held-Results Will Be Announced Within Three Months.

Four men competed in the Rhodes scholarship examination held Tuesday and Wednesday. They were represent atives of the three universities in the vicinity of Lincoln, no men coming from the colleges in the state, as had been expected.
W. F. Crossland, Wesleyan, '13, and Avery Morton. Cotner, '13, pepresented the out-of the city schools, and N. A. Negley. U. of N., '12, and M. V. Reed. U. of N., 14, were the men who took the examination from the University L. P. Newkirk, who fulfiled the qualifications at the time of the last examination but was not appointed to the scholatribip, took the examinations in Creek Newkirk graduated from Wesleyan last year and is registered in the University of Nebraska Law School this year.
The success of the candidates will be announced in about two months and the appointment will be made about a month later. As many of the contestants as pass in the examination will be eligible to a scholarship, etther in this or in any succeeding year, so long as they are under 25 years of age Under the ruling. Newkirk, who passed last year, is now on the "waiting list" and is eligible to appointment instead of the candidates of this year.
The candidates gave varying reports as to the "stiffness" of the examination. Latin prose composition came in for a large share of what was said. however. In England the students in the elementary schools are trained to write Latin from the first, and as a rule they are more proficient at this than their American cousins. Consequently they expect a good deal from the men who come over from America, and the examination is hard in this subject.
