SUBSCRIPTION FROM BUSINESS MEN SEND THEM.

### WILL AID NEBRASKA ROOTERS

Joined at Omaha by Car Full of Cornhusker Supporters—Thirty Musicians Make Trip to the Gopher Camp.

The band has gone. They made a somewhat quiet getaway and very few students were on hand to witness their departure. Nevertheless, each man will "be there with bells on" when the Cornhusker team steps upon Northrup Field, and for some time afterwards. All have resolved to do their best to deserve the confidence of those who made their trip possible, and to send old "U—U—U—U—U" reverberating across Northrup Field to inspire the Cornhuskers in their annual fight against ancient enemies.

A subscription sheet was circulated late Thursday afternoon in the Innocents and others who volunteered their support, and by Friday afternoon a fund of \$600 was secured. Over \$200 of this was subscribed by business men and alumni, \$75 by the students, and the remainder by the athletic board. Much credit is due to the business men and "old grads" for their loyal support, and they deserve a vote of thanks from the entire student body.

The cadet musicians left Lincoln over the Burlington at 6 p. m. numbering about thirty strong. A large delegation of Nebraskans accompanied the band and two special coaches were chartered for the occasion. At Omaha another car of Nebraska enthusiasts joined them to swell the Nebraska representation on Northrup Field.

### PALLADIANS RANK HIGH

Scholarship Statistics Show Historic Literary Society to Be Among the Best in Studies.

The statistics which have been compiled showing the scholarship standing of University students, and especially those which apply to various social organizations, have been of particular interest to University alumni. It gives the "old grad" a thrill of pleasure to learn that the scholarship ideals of his day have been maintained by the members of his particular organization. The Palladian standing has not hitherto been published. It will doubtless be of interest to all who are concerned with University life. Some other averages are given for comparison.
