**HARMON'S SPRAINED ANKLE IS ONLY WEAKNESS IN TEAM.**

**POTTER GETS BACK IN GAME**

**With Unusually Heavy Line to Buck, Stiehm Depends on Speed of Tackles and Ends to Win Victory.**

The Cornhuskers departed this morning about 1:30 for the camp of the Tigers, accompanied by the coaches and trainers. All of the squad were in fine condition except Harmon, who injured his ankle again Wednesday evening in practice. Coach Stiehm expects the Scarlet and Cream warriors to win, but expressed no fond hopes of making more than 29 points against the Tigers. The coaches gave out no lineup, as none will be chosen until the team is ready to appear upon the field Saturday. The line has been the greatest bother to the coaches the past week, and most of their attention has been directed toward the forwards.

The backfield situation is very pleasing, for there are two good men for each position. In Potter and Towle Nebraska has two of the best quarters that ever donned the moleskins. The former is the only dependable drop kicker the Cornhuskers have had for years. Towle runs the team with lots of pep and instils into them the ginger which carries them to tear up the opponents' line.

The Tiger line is quite a little heavier than the one Coach Stiehm will send against them Saturday. The center is light, but is supported by a couple heavy guards and tackles. The Tiger ends have been playing havoc with the teams they have met this fall. They get down under punts with amazing speed and are sure tacklers.

The backfield outweighs the Cornhuskers, but are not as speedy. Mac Williams and Knobel are depended on to lug the ball for sure gains, although Shephard has shown up prominently in the recent games. Shephard has done all of the kicking so far this season. He is a good punter, his punt averaging close to the 50 yard mark.

The squad which started was composed of Allan, Mastin, Swanson, Pearson, Mulligan, Howard, Friezag, Irwin, Halligan, Purdy, Hyde, Beck, Hawkins, Towle, Potter, Hanzlik, Magor Harmon and Captain Frank.

Mr. Hugo Birkner, '08, Phi Delta Theta, will be married to Miss May Louise Richards at the Lincoln Hotel November 6.

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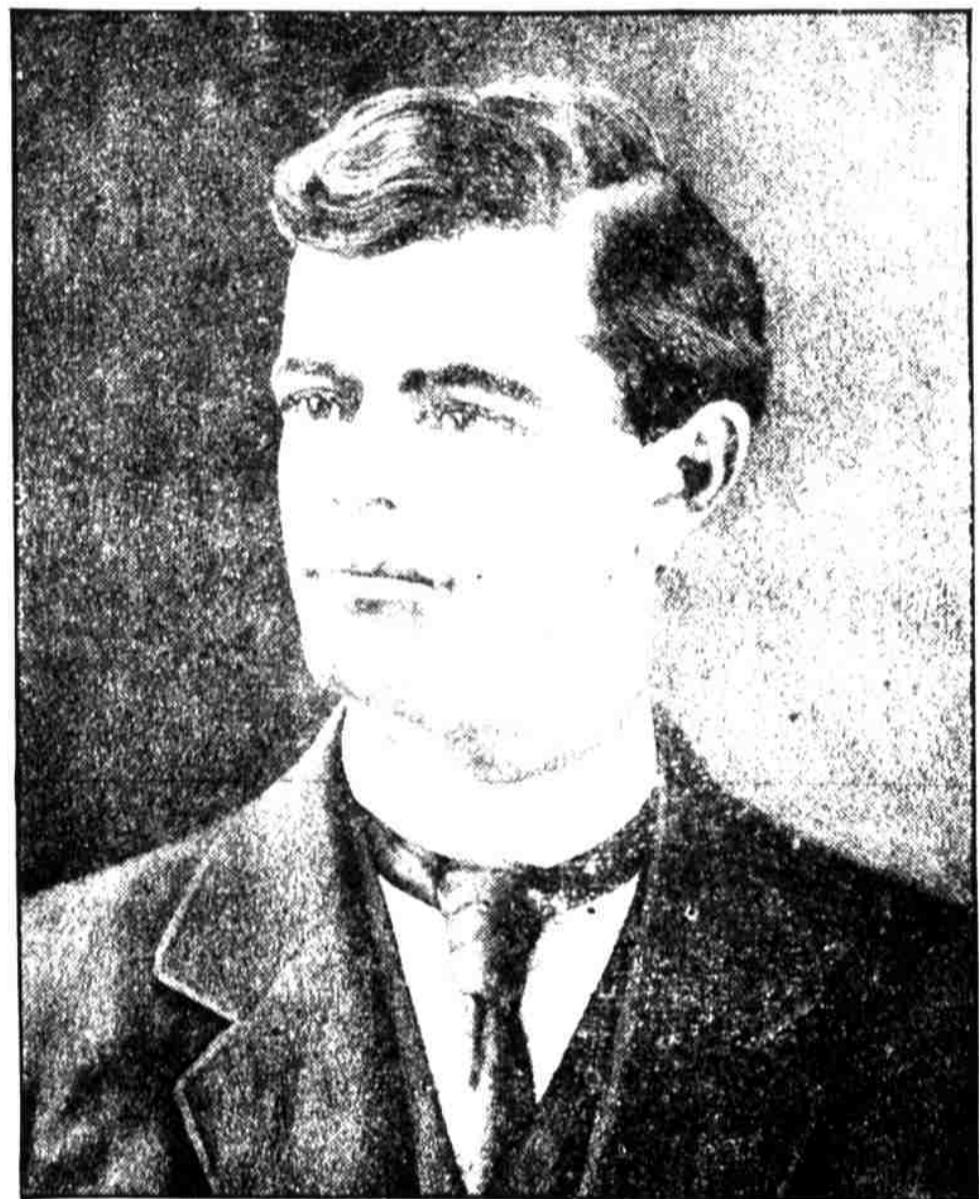
