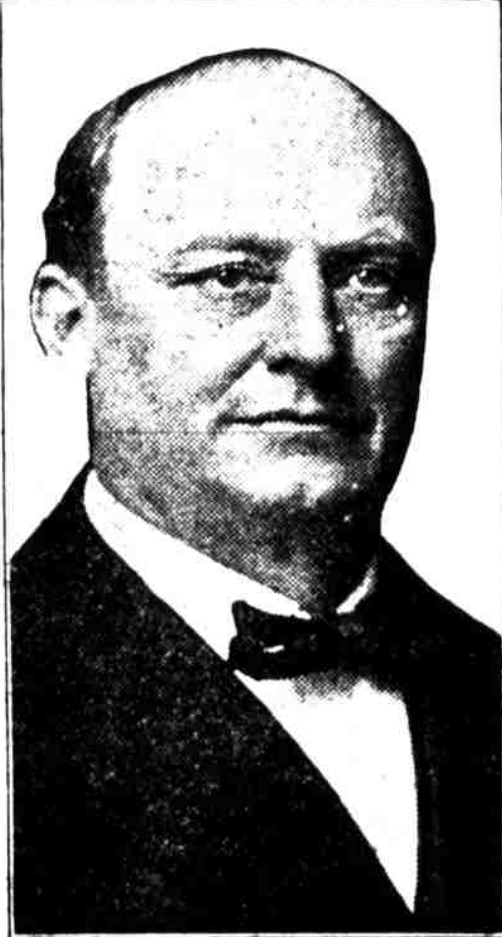

Models of Metallurgical Furnaces for Classes in Engineering Chemistry.

Among the new pieces of apparatus for the chemistry department are some models of metallurgical furnaces, made in Germany, and excellent specimens of the modelmakers' art. They are to be used as illustrative material in Professor Borrowman's classes in engineering chemistry metallurgy and assaying.
