SPECIALS FROM KANSAS AND OMAHA ARRIVE EARLY.

RESERVATIONS STILL POUR IN

Moving Pictures May Be Taken, But Company Holding Contract Has Made No Move to Take Advantage of It.

News that the entire reservation of seats for the Omaha special train had been sold was not the only sign yesterday that there was a big game due tomorrow. Orders by the score have been coming in from all parts of the state, but the majority of these must take seats in less favorable locations than desired. Temporary bleachers are in the course of construction, and Manager Reed expects to handle one of the largest crowds ever on Nebraska field.

A contract was let last spring with a reliable firm in Lawrence, Kas., to take moving pictures of the game tomorrow, but nothing has been heard from them concerning the "movies." It is hoped that they keep their promise, for it would renew old times to live over a good football game some time next winter when the mercury hangs below the zero mark.

- Heavyweight—Anderson


These men all took part in the Olympics last year.
