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NEW RESEARCH WORK

UNIVERSITY STUDENTS WILL
STUDY STATE RECORDS.

WILL PUBLISH BEST RESULTS

Over Dozen Students Already Engaged
in Special Study--Sheldon Issues
Report of Available
Sources.

The systematic study and compilation of material bearing upon the social and political progress of the state of Nebraska has been undertaken by the University through a seminar formed by the three departments of American History, under Prof. H. W. Caldwell, political economy, under Prof. J. R. Le Rossignol, and political science and sociology, under Dr. G. E. Howard. It is the plan to carry on a series of researches by the more advanced students in the unpublished material found in the archives of the state, with publication from time to time of the more valuable results of these studies for general public information.

Already about a dozen students are working upon topics in this field, and it is expected that future years will bring the brightest student minds into this work. This plan of research and publication is carried on in other states, notably in Wisconsin and Iowa, and has been a great aid toward the knowledge of the history of the state and the solution of present day problems.

The sources which will be used in this work are the manuscripts in the Nebraska archives. There are a number of important papers in each office of the state departments which pertain to historical facts of the state, dry and dusty documents now, but soon to be woven into the literature, essay, romance, and drama of future generations.

Addison E. Sheldon, director of the legislative reference bureau, has recently made a report on these manuscripts and this has been included in the annual report of the American Historical Association, just issued at

Washington. The report is the first of its kind upon the Nebraska Archives and contains a historical introduction briefly reviewing the political history of the state and locating the principal sources for that history. It points out, further, that the papers are in a condition of disorder and decay, owing to inadequate vault room, urging that this matter be attended to. A greater part of Nebraska's historical record is contained in these documents and their preservation is a matter of state consideration.
