MEDICAL COLLEGE RATED HIGH

National Medical Boards Declare Nebraska's College to Be of First Class, Omitting Ia. and Kas.

The status of the Medical College of Nebraska in comparison with the medical schools of Nebraska, Kansas and Iowa, has recently been determined in a manner that should be a source of pride to the local medicals. The council on education of the American Medical Association some time ago classified Nebraska's medical school as the only one of first class in the state. Later, when the New York state board of health revised its list of acceptable medical schools, it left the state's medical school the only approved one in the state.

The importance of these classifications is shown by the fact that the national association recognized no school in Kansas to be of first class, while the New York board omits the medical college of Iowa from its list of acceptables. The action of the two classifying agencies goes to prove beyond doubt that Nebraska's medical college is superior to any similar institution either in this state or in her southern or eastern neighbors.—Cut.
