

RETRIEVES LOST HONORS

CROSS-COUNTRY TEAM WINS AT OMAHA RUN.

CAPTAIN BOGGS PLACES FIRST

Team Started Race in Good Condition and Wins High Place Out of 38 Entries—Distance Three and One-Half Miles.

In the annual Y. M. C. A. cross-country meet held at Omaha on Thanksgiving Day, Nebraska's distance team partially retrieved their recent Missouri Valley defeat by winning first place and securing a handsome silver cup of no mean dimensions for the school's trophy room. The whole team showed up exceptionally well among a large number of contestants.

The five men entered for Nebraska were Boggs, McMasters, Diers, Kratz, and Anderson. All the men were in good physical condition and the result of the meet was a more fitting demonstration of their distance ability than the meet at Columbia, Mo.

McMasters Wins Second.

Boggs, captain of this year's cross-country team, succeeded in winning first place, while McMasters, whose studies prevented him from being entered with the Missouri Valley team, came in second. Diers made sixth place, Kratz eleventh, and Anderson twelfth. The use of spikes on a hard road was a serious handicap to Anderson and offers an excuse for his low place.

The Y. M. C. A. cross-country meet is held yearly in Omaha under direction of the Omaha Y. M. C. A. Either teams or individuals may compete in the run, the distance of which is three and one-half miles. The course ran west from the Y. M. C. A. to Central boulevard, thence along the boulevard to Cumming, and from Cumming along Sixteenth to the starting point. The fact that there were thirty-eight individual entries is evidence of the fact that the winning of a forward place was the result of no small effort on the part of Nebraska's men.—Cut.
