NEBRASKA WELL REPRESENTED

Out of Many Universities Nebraska Sends Best Delegation to Meeting of Scientific Association in Cleveland.

Of the large number of universities sending representatives to the American Association of the Advancement of Science, held in Cleveland, Ohio, last week, considerable comment was made of the fact that Nebraska had fourteen men present. The University of Nebraska was the best represented school west of the Mississippi river, having a relatively better delegation present even than the eastern schools.

Among the honors distributed, Dr. F. D. Barker of the Zoology department was elected to the council, which is the highest executive body of the association. Professor E. B. Wilson of Columbia university, the greatest living zoologist, was chosen by the council to be the president of the 1913 meeting to be held in Atlanta, Ga. Philadelphia was chosen as the 1914 meeting place and San Francisco for 1915.

The Sigma Xi fraternity voted to start the publication of a quarterly bulletin to be issued to 8,000 active alumni members.

Dean Wolcott, while in attendance at the Association, was pleased to hear that the University of Nebraska Medical college already has a national reputation. Dr. Wolcott spent some time considering men for appointments to the vacancies in Omaha. No definite appointments have as yet been made.
