

**SHOWS VIEWS OF BIG DITCH BASKET SHOOTER TO RETURN**

Dr. Fisher Lectures for Panama-Pacific Exposition—Announces Atlantic-Pacific Wedding.

**LECTURED IN TEMPLE THEATRE**

Dr. Frederick V. Fisher of San Francisco delivered an illustrated lecture on Panama and San Francisco last evening at 5 o'clock in the Temple theatre. A good sized crowd heard the lecture and, though the lantern refused to give the best of service on account of low power, the pictures were very good and greatly appreciated.

The first part of the lecture was devoted to the Panama Canal. In beginning Dr. Fisher said, "We are on a journey to announce a wedding—the wedding of the Atlantic and the Pacific oceans." The views which were shown in connection with this part of the lecture were prepared last summer for the use of the government and showed in detail the construction of the canal, the locks, and the Gatun dam.

The last part of the lecture was about the Panama-Pacific exposition, which is to be held for nine months in San Francisco in 1915. "For this exposition," said Dr. Fisher, "We are going to spend more money than has been spent for similar displays since 1751. In all there will be over a hundred million dollars expended. The exposition is to be not only the greatest in display, but wonderfully great for educational purposes." With this part of the talk views of different routes leading to San Francisco, the city itself and vicinity, and the location of the fair grounds were shown. These slides were prepared within the last month, illustrating California under present conditions.

Dr. Fisher is conducting this tour under the management of the Panama-Pacific exposition, of which he is manager of the bureau of lectures. They have been working eastward since starting, coming to Lincoln from Denver. From Lincoln they go to Omaha. January 28, Dr. Fisher returns to Lincoln as the guest of the city and will speak before the Commercial Club.

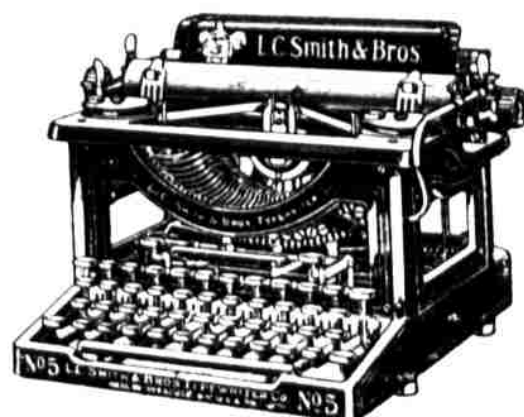
