# NEWLY INSTALLED GOVERNOR OPPOSES FARM AS UNIVER-SITY SITE.

**REMOVAL GETS SETBACK** 

# SEPARATION IS NO HANDICAP

Consolidation With Agricultural School Would Take Means of Support From Many Worthy Students.

University removal was one of the points brought out in the messages of ex-Governor Aldrich and Governor Morehead yesterday afternoon in the joint session of the house of representatives and senate. The retiring governor favored the removal of the university to the State Farm while Governor Morehead takes the other stand. Without a doubt the removal question will come up again this legislature and the question may be settled once and for all. On the question of removal Governor Morehead had the following to say: er-HareoraR

"I favor a lieral policy towards our educational institutions. Our state ranks among the first in the union in her educational advantages, and I am confident that our people want appropriations sufficient to maintain her standing as a progressive state in educational afairs.

"Our university has made remarkale advances, and I am satisfied it is in the control of splendid men, and under wise management. This institution, however, is handicapped for want of revenue, its funds being raised entirely from direct taxation. This condition, therefore, would cause me to be opposed to its removal from its present location, especially in view of the fact that removal would mean a practical total loss as far as the the present buildings are concerned, site.
