Doctor Winfield Scott Hall to Address Men Only Next Sunday at Temple.

Doctor Winfield Scott Hall of Northwestern Medical college, Chicago, will speak to men only at the Temple theatre, 3:30 next Sunday afternoon, February 16. Doctor Hall is probably the foremost authority in the United States on sex hygiene and is the author of the book entitled, "Reproduction and Sex Hygiene," which has been for years an authorized text on this subject. He also gives a series of lectures at Lake Geneva every summer in connection with the summer school of the Chicago Young Men's Christian Association training school.

Doctor Hall has been in Lincoln and has spoken at the Oliver theatre to crowded houses. His talks are scientific but plain enough so everyone can understand him, using his own charts and free-hand drawings for purposes of illustration. He will be at Wesleyan and Cotner over Saturday and will speak at some local church Sunday evening.
