## THE JUNIOR PLAY.

The Junior class play, "Nathan Hale," staged at the Oliver last Friday night, has been variously criticized. Advocates of lighter stuff for a collegiate audience assert that it is too hard for a college audience to appreciate the deep and serious parts of an historical drama. And they also contend that college students are not in sympathy with the sort of a production. However well founded these theories may be a well advertised and well prepared play, like "Nathan Hale"

rendered by a University class, should be heard and appreciated by as large an audience as a similar production by the ordinary theatrical troupe.

The fact that the Junior play was a financial failure must be attributed to causes quite apart from an improper selection of the drama. It was quite generally known that the cast began practice only three weeks before the play was staged. This fact no doubt, prevented the sale of tickets to people who are afraid that they won't get their money's worth. Furthermore, the junior amateurs had to follow Sothern and Marlow, and therefore the week's stock of theatregoers was more than exhausted by the exceptional and costly Shakespearian productions. Add to these facts, the need of more extended publicity for so representative an activity as a class play, and you have many other causes to put the play in the hole besides a sudden and serious descent into tragedy.

## FORTY HIGH SCHOOLS ENTERED

Basketball Tournament Next Month Promises to Be the Best in History of Event.

Manager Guy Reed announces that over forty schools have sent in their entries for the state basketball meet which will be held here on March 13, 14, 15. This year's entry list is much larger than last year's and many of the smaller high schools are looked upon as prospective champions.
