THE SLAUGHTER OF UNIVERSITY

All who attended the Kansas-Nebraska basketball game say that their student tickets to all athletic events would not admit them to the game. They say that no one could get into the game unless he paid 50 or 75 cents for admission. This is not too much to pay for so important a basketball game. And we can conceive that Kansas probably needed the money.

But the managers of the game must have known that they were violating their contract with the purchasers

of season tickets. They must have known that the season ticket purports to let the holder in to all athletic events on the home field. And if they intended to charge more than they did for season tickets, they could have known that the proper business way to do would be to add what they needed to the price of the season tickets. To hold men up at the door for more than the agreed price, is, in our judgment entirely too wide a departure from ordinary business integrity.

Besides, such an arbitrary violation of a contract with the students puts a damper on spirit. And of all things athletics appear to need enthusiasm the most. But we submit that the student who has bought a season ticket to an athletic event, and is then informed at the door that he must pay two or three times the value of his ticket to the event, has not the very best of feeling toward the activities of his school.

We very justly and rightfully suppose that the University cares more to subsist on his finances than it does for his enthusiasm. The result is that a poor student ceases to patronize the games, and fruitless effort is spent trying to arouse a spirit for which no one can know in advance how much he will have to pay. FOR THE SAKE OF COMMERCIAL FAIRNESS AND UNIVERSITY SPIRIT, PUBLIC SENTIMENT SHOULD CONDEMN THIS VIOLATION OF CONTRACT.
