ENGINEERS ARE SCHEDULED TO TAKE CHARGE OF SCHOOL WEEK AFTER NEXT.

MANY EVENTS ARE PLANNED

Will Put Out Special Edition "Rag," Have Special Convocation and Play Ball With the Laws —Maybe.

DRILL MEN HEAR INTERESTING LECTURE BY COMMANDANT

Future Policy of Appointment is Detailed.—Lieutenant Bowman Tells Omaha Experiences.

Inclement weather last evening prevented the cadets from undergoing their usual hour's drill. They gathered in the chapel and listened to a short talk by Commandant Bowman. He outlined the new method to be used in promoting the cadet officers and said that all commissioned officers for the next years will be picked from this year's men or those who have had at least three year's of military training. First sergeants will be picked from second year men, etc. The rifle team is also to be composed of Juniors and Seniors, men who have had the most training in this kind of work. Government inspection comes on the twelfth of May, and every effort is being made to prepare the men for the event.

Commandant Bowman praised the work of the University cadets at Omaha, many of whom are enlisted in the National Guards. Many lives and much property were saved by the efficient work of the boys in kaki. Commandant Bowman was in direct charge of the regulars and was in a good position to observe the work of the troops.
