In her schools, less old Chinese learning and more practical western knowledge must be taught. In place of her old almanacs that are at best only catalogs of the facts, China needs a progressive periodical press that can really influence and educate public opinion. Internationally, she needs not the exploitation of foreign powers but she must have their recognition particularly the recognition of the United States. Above all, says the Doctor in summarizing the work of social and industrial transformation in China,—"Let us hope that the ones upon whom this work devolves will be men who possess a statesmanlike grasp of the nature and import of the problems with which they are dealing; clear-headed, noble-hearted men; men who can grasp principles and discern tendencies; men of intellect as well as impulse; men of patriotism as well as power.

The excellence of Doctor Maxey's scholarly observations as outlined above is further evidence by the superb rhetoric in which his conclusions are couched. His rich, accurate and responsive vocabulary, his clear, virile sentences, his unified paragraphs that ease the brain rather than the eye, his entire thesis that abounds so freely and consistently in expressions of his fundamental political philosophy, all these things contribute to the permanent effect his eloquent but scientific appeal for interest in China has on his readers. His production very truly represents to the American university world the profound, vital and beautiful scholarship in which the Nebraska student matures.

The publicity which the doings of bodies like the Inter-Fraternity Council get through the columns of this paper will depend exclusively on the willingness of such bodies to have their meetings covered by some Nebraskan representative in whose ability to report the real facts we have confidence.
