#### GERMAN PROFS KEEP ON TALKING ON WAY TO DOOR

Professor Lochy Writes that Dif- Herman ..... Leon Snyder ficulty Is Experienced in Shutting Them Off

A letter received a short time ago by Prof. Caldwell from Prof. G. W. Locky who is now taking graduate work in Germany, describes very well the conditions as they are in a German

To quote from the letter, he says, "It is so different from the university life at home. The Vereins (corps or traternities) are here and externally make a great show, but are not the heart and life of the university. We hardly know what study is. Each professor enters upon his Vorlessung lecture, as if his life depended on its delivery. He hardly halts to take breath until the bell rings him down when he leaves the stage talking all the way to the door. When he returns the next day he finishes the sentence he was on when he left, and begins talking before he reaches the platform. Of course 1 ave described a single professor but others are quite similar \* \* \* All seem desperately in earnest, wrapped up in a very narrow field. We see in perspective, they in detail \* \* \* The attentiveness of the student has surprised me. It is probably because all are virtually doing graduate work, and of the 3,000 or more students no one is in the class except for business. In one of the lectures I attend there are over 300 students, and when the professor pauses after one of his long sentences, the stillness seems almost oppressive. I have seen a student fall asleep during the lecture but never whisper or show the least sign of lack of interest. The respect shown to a professor here can scarcely be understood by an American."

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
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
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
