

BIG TRACK MEET IVY DAY

FOR WHICH TICKETS WILL BE ON SALE MONDAY AT THE TEMPLE INCLUDES EVENING EVENTS.

TWENTY-FIVE CENTS OPENS GATES

Program Includes Many Novel Features and Races—All Eligible But Must Enter by Classes.

The annual interclass track meet will be held on the State Farm campus Ivy Day. The program consists of several new and novel feature events in addition to the regular numbers. This year the weight contests have been eliminated and two interesting relay events added. These consist of a shuttle relay in which each man runs 100 yards in the opposite direction to that of his predecessor, and the novelty relay the details of which have not yet been determined. Each class will have teams in each event and the competition bids fair to be the keenest of the year.

All bona fide University students are eligible to compete in any of the events provided they register their names on the entry list under the various events in which they wish to compete. This list is posted on the bulletin board in the gymnasium entrance and all entrants must have their names enrolled before Saturday night, May 17.

The program will contain the following events: 100 yard dash, 200 yard dash, 440 yard run, one-half mile run, mile run, 120 yard high hurdles, 220 yard low hurdles, pole vault, high jump, broad jump, one-half mile relay, novelty relay, and shuttle relay. Sterling silver medals will be awarded for first place winners, bronze medals for second place, and ribbons for third place. The meet will start at 2 o'clock sharp and will be run off in sharp order with no drags or delays.

Work starts immediately on the track which will be in the best of shape by next Wednesday. The relay teams will represent the four classes and each man signing the entry sheet must designate the class to which he belongs.
