PUBLICATION OF "AG" CLUB NOW BEING EDITED AND FIRST ISSUE WILL BE OUT SOON.

CIRCULATION HAS REACHED 1000

H. W. Richey and R. O. Smith Responsible for Volume XII—Magazine Goes to Many Old Students.

"Agriculture," the official agricultural publication of the University, is now being rushed to press, and indications are that the first issue of the year, and of volume XII, will be out October 12. It will be the first of the departmental magazines issued this fall, and will be of interest to students in other colleges as well as those in the farm course.

The staff of this year's magazine is headed by H. W. Richey, editor-in-chief, assisted by R. J. Posson, associate editor, H. A. Jones, exchange editor, R. O. Smith, business manager, and E. I. Goodbody, circulation manager. The circulation has increased since the first volume was edited, keeping pace with the increase in enrollment in the Agricultural School and College, and at present it is rated close to 1,000.

The publication originated in 1902 under its present name—The Agriculture—and was promoted by the members of the Association of Agricultural Students of the University, with Prof. A. E. Maecker, now connected with the Nebraska Silo Company as business manager, and Prof. A. C. Davison, former principal of the School of Agriculture, as editor. In 1911 it was turned over to the Agriculture Club, and the first staff of student editors was headed by O. H. Liebers, editor, and Will Forbes, business manager. Last year the editorship went to Roy E. Marshall, and A. H. Beckhoff was business manager.

The magazine enjoys quite an extensive circulation, inasmuch as it is taken by many up-to-date farmers over the state and by the graduates and former students of the college and school. Its articles are of both general and scientific interest, and show careful preparation.
