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### JANITOR GETS "IN BAD"

CALLS ATTENTION OF VISITING BANKERS TO "NO SMOKING" SIGNS ON CAMPUS.

#### THOT ONLY TO OBEY ORDERS

Visiting Bankers Not Included in "Campus Smoking" Rule-Strange Wanderings of This Fragrant Smoke.

A misunderstanding as to the rigidity of the University campus rule against smoking was the cause of a slight altercation between the authorities and the janitor of the Temple yesterday during the course of the bankers' convention. Believing that the rule prohibiting smoking on the campus was applicable not alone to students but to all visitors as well, the janitor called the attention of one of the members of the convention to the "No Smoking" sign found at various places throughout the building.

Apparently the gentleman accosted resented the janitor's action as an insult, for shortly after a complaint reached the authorities. A notice was immediately sent to the Temple official in no gentle tones asking that the friends of the University be no more insulted. Yesterday the "No Smoking" signs were taken down.

Obviously, neither party was to blame. The janitor considered himself as acting under the general instructions prohibiting smoking in calling notice to the sign, while the authorities in reprimanding him felt only the obligation to extend every courtesy to the visiting bankers.

Nevertheless, the unwonted sight of a thick cloud of fragrant smoke floating through the door of the theater into the lobby, where it snuggled playfully in the hair of old Demosthenes.
