Hard Practice Yesterday.

The practice yesterday afternoon out on the Fair grounds was hard and consumed some forty minutes. For twenty minutes the varsity lined up against the freshmen. The balance of the period they clashed with the scrubs, the latter using Minnesota formations. These the cream and white jerseyed boys had little difficulty in solving. In fact they played rings around both the scrubs and freshmen. In the course of the scrimmage the varsity made what would have been eight touchdowns on a regulation field.

Forward Passes Work Well.

The whole catalog of varsity plays was used and with satisfactory results. Line plunges, end runs and forward passes all came in for their share of attention. Good gains were made with nearly the whole repertoire. Especially did the forward passes make good. Mustie Beck and Howard got clear several times after receiving the pie-skin via the air line.

Coach Stehm expressed himself as being much pleased with the showing of the varsity. He has again shifted the line up. Ross was back in his old place at left guard with Heller in at right tackle. Captain Purdy has seemingly recovered from his slight indisposition of Tuesday night and was back in the line-up delivering the goods. Towle and Beck again alternated at the pivot position.

This is one of his strongest plays, and by it, the Dramatic Club will show its change in the nature of the plays that they will hereafter produce.

It was organized twelve years ago, and up to the time of the forming of the Kosmet Klub, it has been the only organization of its kind to encourage college dramatics. Tonight the Dramatic Club will hold its first monthly meeting of the year in the club rooms and more definite arrangements made for the tryouts.

OLYMPICS RALLIES 7 P. M.

BOTH CLASSES WILL PREPARE FOR BIG INTERCLASS CONTEST SATURDAY.

ALL EVENTS TO COUNT MUCH

Capable Representatives Necessary For Each Contest If Victory Is Expected.

The freshman and sophomore presidents have made long strides in organizing their cohorts for the fight of Saturday morning. Both have appointed committees to take charge of the various events and have been gathering candidates for the tryouts.

The first organized meetings of the classes as political bodies will be held this evening in the Armory. The freshmen will meet in the east end of the Armory in the gymnasium and the sophomores will meet in the chapel at the west end, both meetings to convene at seven o'clock. Several speakers from among the upperclassmen will give what advice they deem helpful and reminiscences they retain from going through the battle in former years. After the rallies, the tryouts for the various events will be held by both classes in the gymnasium. The winners only in the tryouts will compete Saturday.

The events will be scored and arranged as follows:

Boxing events	5 points
Medicine ball fight	20 points
Wrestling event	5 points
Boxing event	5 points
Wrestling event	5 points
The big free-for-all	35 points
Total	70 points

The importance of securing able athletes for the single events is apparent from the fact that each one counts 5 points. The winning of all the single events together with the medicine ball fight or the winning of the free-for-all with one single event will determine the victors.

The single events will be run off as quickly as possible between the winners of the tryouts. In the medicine ball fight, the two teams of about twenty-five men each picked from the two classes will be lined up some forty rods apart with a twenty foot pole mid way between. The object of the contestants will be to secure the heavy medicine ball from the top of the pole and get it over the goal line of either side. In the free-for-all all the members of the classes will be entered en masse. The two bodies will be lined facing each other on their respective goal lines. At a given
