

**FRESHMEN FAIL TO GET CLEAR IDEA OF LIBRARY**

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**PROFANE ROOTING WIPED OUT TWO YEARS AGO TODAY**

**Greatest Provoker of Student Enthusiasm Suffers Demise at That Time.**

"Cheer-cheer," the official "rough-neck" song, fell into disrepute two years ago today, hence this lengthy discourse. This vulgar song together with a few of the more select yells containing ungentlemanly wording received the brunt of the wrath of the faculty and were immediately placed under the ban.

Chancellor Avery made a trip to the Pacific coast along in November, 1912, and while there attended a football game between the University of Washington and the State Agricultural College. The rooting at this game, while consistent and vociferous, was devoid of all swear words and at the same time instructive in school spirit. At a football rally, held soon after his return, the Chancellor urged the students to "leave out all slang and profane phrases from their football rooting." Other members of the faculty took up arms with Chancellor Avery and remonstrated against such exuberances.

Like the old proverb "Fools' names and fools' faces are seen in all public places," these songs and yells were too often heard in public. While they are not particularly degrading in their language, still such phrases are more becoming in a ho-bo camp than on the athletic field or other historical spots in Lincoln.
