AMES TAKES M. V. MEET

CAPTAIN OF AGGIE SQUAD TAKES
FIRST PLACE IN ANNUAL
CROSS COUNTRY.

NEBRASKA IN THIRD PLACE

Goetze Second Man in but Total Score
Puts Ames and Missouri in
First Places.

The Ames Aggie squad won the
Missouri Valley cross country run Sat-
urday with only 22 points scored
against them. Captain Snyder of the
Aggie team, closely followed by
Goetze of the Nebraska squad, crossed
the line just before the whistle blew
terminating the first half of the Ne-
braska-Wesleyan football game. Sny-
der's time was remarkably fast, con-
sidering the unfavorable weather con-
dition. He ran the five miles in 27
minutes and 22 seconds. Goetze was
checked on to a close second by the
crowd of rooters in the grandstand.
On Goetze's heels came the remainder
of the Ames team, not an Aggie lag-
ging farther behind than the eighth
place. The Missouri Tigers were sec-
ond with 52 points and Nebraska third
with 58. The course extended over the
Tenth street viaduct, east to Four
teenth, north to Belmont, west to
Tenth, and back to the field. Snyder
and Goetze held the lead throughout
the entire run without being pushed
in the least.

The fight for the positions down the
line were fought for all of the way
and outside of the Ames team, which
made a bid for the honors from the
jump, the places were in doubt to the
last. The duel between the Missouri
and Nebraska runners was a pretty
one, but was finally won by the Tigers
when Fawcett and Finley finished in
seventh and tenth places.

sixth; Nookstad, eighth; total, 22
points.

Missouri—Terry (capt.), fifth; Faw-
cett, seventh; Hearst, thirteenth; Ho-
gan, seventeenth; Finley, tenth; total,
52 points.

Nebraska—Goetze, second; McMas-
ter, eleventh; Gerlon, fourteenth; An-
derson, fifteenth; Kratz, sixteenth;
total, 58 points.

Kansas—Edwards (capt.), ninth;
Deeswald, twelfth; Ross, eighteenth;
Spraiser, nineteenth; Vermillion, twen-
tieth; total, 78 points.
