The number will be closely limited, as will be announced in a few days. If you want to go get your tickets before January 15 for we are going to plan to give every man his three dollars worth."

The entire number will be placed on sale immediately following the holidays in the hands of prominent juniors and when they are gone, no amount of money can admit anybody. If desired, tickets may be reserved before the holidays by seeing Bauman.

Several very unusual feature which will make it stand far above the ordinary prom are being planned for the dance. As these are yet in the process of planning, specific disclosures will be made later.
