**LECTURES ON ALBANIA**

ERICKSON TELLS OF EXPERIENCE  
 IN DOWN-TRODDEN COUNTRY  
 ACROSS THE SEA.

**CHANCE FOR THE COLLEGE MAN**

Many Men Needed to Assist in the  
 Government and in Missionary  
 Fields.

A rather startling story of the sack-  
 ing and ruin of Albania, a little coun-  
 try in southern Europe, told at con-  
 vocation yesterday morning by Charles  
 Telford Erickson, furnished an inter-  
 esting sidelight upon the recent trouble  
 in the Balkans. Mr. Erickson is the  
 man who was driven out of Albania  
 by the Servians and later recalled to  
 duty by the new provisional govern-  
 ment. He is now representing his  
 country in the United States.

"Serbia and Greece," said Mr. Erick-  
 son, "desiring to annex Albania, rep-  
 resented to the European powers that  
 it was in a constant state of anarchy.  
 The powers thereupon acquiesced and  
 allowed King George to send his army  
 across the border line. The Grecian  
 soldiers burned the Albanian cities,  
 and, when the women and children at-  
 tempted to escape, forced them, at  
 the points of their bayonets, back into  
 the fires. In one Catholic community  
 they massacred all the men in cold  
 blood, and then forced the women and  
 children to be baptised in the Grecian  
 faith.

"I myself saw the ruins of twenty-  
 two cities. I saw men who had for-  
 merly been worth a half million, now  
 feeding on grass roots and living out  
 in the open with nothing over them  
 but the clear sky. They had been  
 driven from their homes with nothing  
 but the clothing on their backs.

"The invaders have now been driven  
 away, but their influence is still be-  
 ing felt. Agricultural conditions are  
 the same as they were in the time of  
 Father Abraham. This is due, not to  
 the unwillingness of the people, but  
 to the cloven hoofs of Greece and  
 Turkey.

"There is a splendid opportunity for  
 the college men and women of Amer-  
 ica to lead Albania out of the wilder-  
 ness. The missionary field is nowhere  
 else more fertile. The Albanians are  
 crying out to you to help them in their  
 fight to leave behind the misery, the  
 distress and the darkness of the mid-  
 dle ages."

After convocation Mr. Erickson  
 spoke to almost thirty students in the  
 Temple cafeteria. The personal phases  
 of his encounters in this "baby nation"  
 were discussed by Mr. Erickson, and  
 those listening were only partially able  
 to realize what the true status of af-  
 fairs in this territory really are.
