The report of the attendance of the public schools just after the opening of this school year has reached the authorities at Washington. It tion will be concluded at a board shows a very material increase over last year. During the school year 1912-13 there were graduated from the primary course 10,928 boys and 4,102 girls, from the intermediate course 3.643 boys and 1.052 girls; from the secondary course 284 boys and 58 girls. The present year shows a total attendance of 463,518 divided as follows, pri mary 425,093, intermediate 30,576 and secondary 1,910. "It is very evident therefore," says the Director of Edu cation, "that our graduations for this school year are going to be much larger."

Due to the very excellent courses of study provided for the pupils of the public schools and the thorough manner in which they are carried out. gian literature. There are approximately a million children of school age not now provided with public school facilities. This condition is largely due to insufficiency of funds available for appropriation for school purposes. For the year 1912-13 there was expended from Insular, Provi- L. C. Smith & Bros. ncial and Muncipal funds the sum of 3,531,427.91 or 47 cents per capita of total population, while in the United States the average cost of education per capita of population is \$4.45, almost ten times as great.


