**UNIVERSITY NIGHT PLANS RAPIDLY ASSUMING FORM**

Fourth Annual All-Campus Joy Night to Be March 7—Committee Limits Acts to Six—Time Limit is Twenty Minutes.

University Night—the all-University joy night—is to be March 7 this year, and arrangements for putting on an absolutely A-1 evening are under way. The committee in charge met yesterday afternoon and started the stone slipping. Announcement of the date and plans for the event will be sent to the organizations which were on the platform last year, and in the month of time that is left before the performance is to be given six stunts will be polished into form.

The committee—Don Mapes, '15, L. W. Charlesworth, '15, and M. V. Reed, '14—has given out the notice that the stunts this year will be limited to twenty minutes each. This will prevent the acts from dragging, which was the only criticism given the performance last year.

Furthermore, in order to limit the number of acts to six, it will be necessary to enter them on the program on a competitive basis. Each organization which intends to enter a cast must submit a synopsis of its act to the committee by February 18. The ones will be chosen which give the most promise of meeting the exacting approval of the University audience which has crowded the entertainments given in the past three years.

Acts are expected to be submitted by the Laws, the Engineers, the Foresters, the Literary societies, fraternities, Agricultural Club, Band, Glee Club, Military department, and others.

"We aim to make the program representative of campus life," said Don Mapes yesterday, "and to put it over the footlights. To do this the students must support it and the faculty members must overlook little personalities—we're counting on both of them. We have only a month in which to work up the production, but watch our smoke."

Harry G. McCain, Special Secretary for Large Universities, of The Intercollegiate Prohibition Association, will speak at Convocation this morning on "The Fires of the Crucible, or Liquor and the Immigrant."

Mr. McCain has spoken, during the fall of 1913, at thirty-five Annual Conferences of the M. E. Church. As a student he is an irresistible combination of football player, contest winner, popular student leader, and liquor fighter. He has given much special study, at first hand, to drinking customs and saloon influence among immigrant colonies of Chicago.

The Intercollegiate Prohibition Association is now organized in more than 210 colleges and universities and is growing rapidly. "Its purpose is to promote broad study of the liquor problem in its civic and social relations, to align the students of America against the traffic, and to inspire a vision of patriotic service among thousands of prospective leaders of public opinion."
