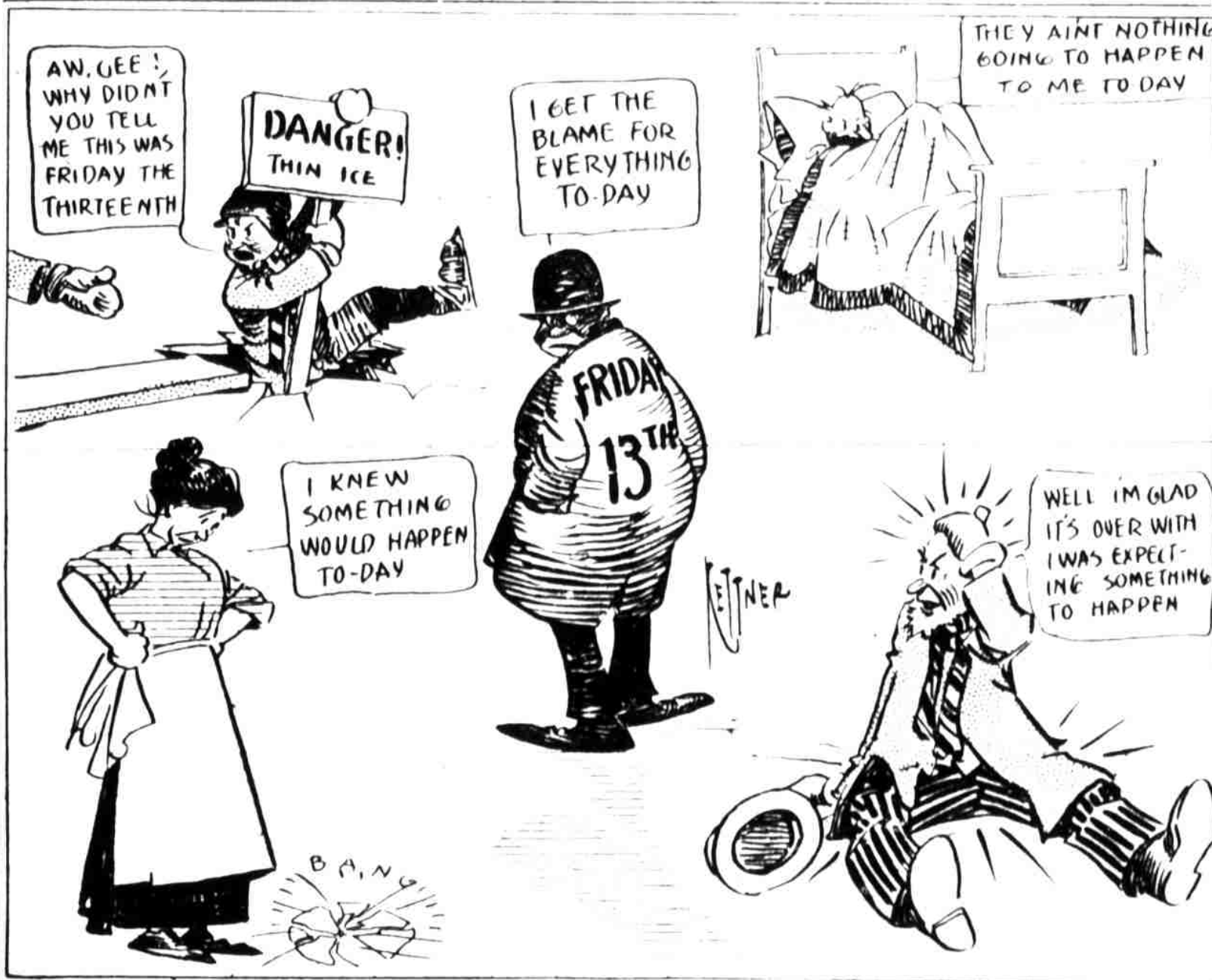
The fifth of the series to be given in the Temple, Saturday, will be a valentine party in honor of the women students who have entered school this semester.

Former Publisher of Nebraskan Seeks Injunction.

Christian Kuhl of the Kuhl Printing company yesterday afternoon obtained from Judge Stewart of the district court a restraining order running against the board of student publications of the University of Nebraska and the business manager of the Daily Nebraskan. The order forbids the defendants delivering any copy for the Daily Nebraskan to anyone beside the plaintiff, and particularly to the Western Newspaper Union. They are also restrained from paying or causing to be paid to anyone other than the plaintiff any money for the printing of the publication mentioned. Hearing on the application for a temporary injunction is set for this afternoon.

DRAKE-NEBRASKA SCORES OF YEARS GONE BY

Two Missouri Conference Teams to Cross Swords Tonight on Local Floor.

In 1909 four games were played. The two games on Nebraska floor were 39 to 30 and 34 to 12, both in favor of the Huskers. The return games at Des Moines were both defeats, 12 to 34 and 15 to 25.

In 1910, all four games were victories, 40 to 14, 26 to 6, 20 to 16 and 22 to 13.

There were no games in 1911. Four games were played in 1912, which resulted in a clean sweep for Nebraska, 42 to 24, 35 to 13; the Des Moines games 33 to 15 and 46 to 14.

Last year we again swept clean. The two games on Nebraska's floor were 32 to 7 and 24 to 15. On our visit to Drake, the Huskers won 21 to 4 and 25 to 10.

HIGH MARKS MADE AT CHARTER DAY INDOOR MEETS.

THE EVENTS FOR THIS YEAR

Eighth Event is an Inter-Class Relay Race—Record Breakers Will Be in Meet—Charter Day, Monday.

On Monday afternoon the annual Charter Day meet will be held in the Armory. Eight events are upon the program. The events are given below in the order that they will be run off:

First event, 25-yard dash. The record for this event is 3 seconds, and is held by E. W. Brannon, who is the present sporting editor of the Lincoln Daily Star.

Second event, pole vault. The record is 11 feet 2 inches, which was made a year ago by A. C. Linstrum. He will be a contestant again this year.

Third event, 12-pound shot. Record is 44 feet 7 inches. This record is held by Herbert Reese, star sprinter of the University.

Fourth event, fence vault. Six feet 8 1/2 inches. Made by A. B. Chain in 1909.

Fifth event, high jump. Five feet 9 inches. Made by J. C. Knipe, 1907, and Paul Athes, 1907.

Sixth event, running high kick. Five feet 9 inches. This is held by C. B. Meyers, and is not only a University, but a world record. This C. B. Meyer is our "Seven" Meyer of basketball fame. The record was made last year.

Seventh event, rope climb, 18 feet high. Time, 6 seconds. Made by L. Peck in 1906.

The eighth event is the relay race. This is an inter-class event.

The gymnasium has been the scene of busy training for the past few weeks and keen rivalry is expected in all the above events for the places of honor. From the showing which has been made by some of the particular stars, it is expected that there will be something doing in the way of breaking records.

RUSSIAN PROGRAM GIVEN AT COSMOPOLITAN CLUB

First Meeting a Success—Chancellor Avery Speaks on Race Prejudice.

About forty students and faculty members met in Music Hall of the Temple last Wednesday evening to reorganize the Cosmopolitan Club. The nations represented were America, Armenia, Bohemia, Germany, India, Japan, Korea, Russia and Syria.

The movement to reorganize the club was started by the University Federation of Church Workers. In calling the meeting to order, Rev. Howard stated that the purpose of the club was to promote mutual acquaintance of the different nationalities in school.

As soon as the club is able to hold regular meetings, each evening will be given over to a different nationality, who will be expected to render a program characteristic of their nation. As a sample, Mr. Felix Newton prepared a Russian program for last Wednesday evening. Mr. Ksenotofotof, a former student of St. Petersburg University, and Miss Vlasta Sterba, a Bohemian student of this University,

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
