**NO BASEBALL TEAM FOR
NEBRASKA THIS YEAR**

Present Missouri Conference Rules
Will Not Permit Nebraska
to Enter.

A committee was recently appointed by the Athletic Board to investigate the baseball problem at Nebraska. The members of this committee are: Coach Stiehm, Prof. G. E. Barber and R. C. Linstrum. This committee in their report to the board advises that inter-collegiate baseball be discontinued. They reached this conclusion after a thorough consideration of the Missouri Valley Conference rules and the present condition of athletics at Nebraska.

The following is the report in full:
The following is the Missouri Valley Conference rules regarding baseball:

1. Belief in the necessity of the amateur rule reaffirmed.
 2. Agreed to require students to refrain from participation in summer baseball during their college course except on their own town team where no gate fee is charged.
 3. Agreed to reinstate men who are technically ineligible through ignorance or through the acts of others.

must choose between the University team on the one hand, or a town, semi-professional, or professional team on the other. Frequently he chooses both, feeling that the Conference rule is unfair and that he needs the money to continue his education. This makes it necessary for him to lie to the college authorities concerning summer participation in baseball. The evidence regarding players' connection with summer baseball, such as "acting manager," ticket taker, assumed names, secret pay rolls, salaried commercial positions, padded expense accounts, valuable gifts, proves to a certainty the moral hazard of maintaining college baseball under the present Conference rules.

The influence of association with minor league or "bush" league players is far from good for the college student. The environment is not condu-

cive to the ideals of pure amateurism and college athletics.

Our gymnasium is not equipped with an indoor field and is inadequate for early season practice. This handicaps the players materially when in competition with other Missouri Valley teams.

The length of the season is limited to about six or seven weeks, the University rules prohibit the scheduling of inter-collegiate events in Lincoln for other than the two closing days of the week, frequently we have inclement weather this time of the year. All of these make the drafting of a satisfactory schedule very difficult and prevent the playing of some games.

There is little student and no public interest in varsity baseball, due, to some extent, to the presence of the Western League club in this city. In this connection it is noteworthy that Drake and Washington Universities do not engage in inter-collegiate baseball. Without attendance the game has no value as a spectacle and the gate receipts are exceedingly limited. The Athletic Board cannot afford to spend approximately \$500 to \$1,000 annually for baseball and the cost is entirely out of proportion to the limited number of participants.

The athletic field and drill ground are located in the same limited space. The track team, spring football practice, inter-class and inter-fraternity baseball, military drill and the probable introduction of association (sec-er) football, leave little if any time or room for baseball.

The likely athlete cannot be a candidate for the baseball and track team as well. Both would be weakened to a certain extent. The football player who desires to play baseball must neglect his spring football practice.

We are facing a situation where the football captain-elect has been declared ineligible because of participation in inter-collegiate baseball counting one year of competition.

It is the recommendation of your committee that inter-collegiate baseball be discontinued under the present rules and conditions of the Missouri Valley Conference.
