EVERYMATRON BY SCOTT MUCH LIKE EVERYWOMAN

"Reason" Talks to Everymatron—"Happiness" Shows Her a Merrier Life.

The play "Everymatron," given before the Lincoln Women's Club by the Home department of the club in the Temple Theatre, Monday afternoon, is the production of Prof. R. D. Scott of the English Literature department.

The play resembles the modern morality play "Everywoman" in many ways, although it has in it no male characters. Twelve characters participate in the production, the principal ones being "Vanity," "Pride," "Temptation," "Happiness," "Trouble," and "Reason." "Everymatron" becomes disgusted with life and in an attempt to take her life is confronted by "Reason," who appears in the dark and carries her into the future several weeks, explaining the advantages of foresight and thinking. "Happiness" confronts "Everymatron" with the re-lighting of the stage (for it is temporarily darkened) and conducts her through a happier life.

Professor Scott finished this, the fourth of his productions, on Christmas day, after having worked steadily for nearly five weeks. The plans of the plot he had in his mind for some

time previous to the actual writing of the play. One of the four plays has never been produced and the others are: "The Diplomat," "The Match-makers," and "Everymatron."

ENGINEERS OFF TO OMAHA EARLY IN MAY

Distant Trip Out of Question This Year—Four Professors to Go Along.

It has been definitely decided that the engineers will go to Omaha on May 1st and 2nd to make their annual inspection. Under the general supervision of Professors Hollister, Bridgman, Seaton and Dean, the engineers will visit for inspection a smelting plant, the gas plant, the electric sub-station, the street railway power plant, one of the model plants in this territory; the electric lighting plant, the McKee Motor Company plant, and the city waterworks plant located in Florence.

The inspection this year will be as in former years, but in the future every upper classman will have to make the trip, giving an outlined report, together with a development of some special feature of it, or make an inspection of some plant in Lincoln, under the supervision of some professor, giving a most detailed report of

the inspection in order to equalize the work of an inspection at home with one made out in the state or in some other state, as will probably be the case in the future.

Next year an early agitation will be started for a trip to some large city in order to make it possible to see some of the very best plants. Kansas City, Keokuk and Chicago are already on the list for consideration.
