he can fight for his convictions as an individual. But, through it all, he declared, we must be fair. When the campaign is over all must bury the hatchet; there must be made no enemies of the University.

Judge Allen W. Field said that this is indeed a critical time for the University, and that it is the duty of the alumni to put the proposition before the people of the state. To him it is a very one-sided question. Just tell the people what the facts are and the election is won was his belief. His arguments were: The present site enables many students to work their way through school who could not at the Farm; the University should be located in the heart of business, not away from it; it would cost one and one-half million dollars more to move; removal would mean the tearing down of the old buildings so dear to all graduates—it would mean the destroying of sentiment in connection with the school; all big plants, business or educational, are compact—a large campus would mean a loss of time and efficiency.

Judge C. M. Skiles of David City emphasized the fact that the question will be submitted on separate ballots, and that it takes 35 per cent of the affirmative votes cast at the election in order to carry either proposition, for or against. If this fails, the University will be left high and dry. So it is up to all interested in the University to see to it that all who vote one way or the other on this proposition.

After a round-table discussion of views and ideas the temporary organization—Mr. Pollard, chairman; Mr. Fred W. Hawxby, county attorney of Nemaha county, secretary—was made permanent and the chair was empowered to appoint a committee of seven to have full powers to act as a central committee in conducting the anti-removalist fight next fall.

Before this committee was appointed, Will Owen Jones, president of the Alumni Association, explained that the association felt that it was better not to take a definite stand one way or the other, but that its members could form outside organizations on either side. But he hoped that no ill-feeling might creep into the association over this matter. He gave a bit of advice both for removalists and "antis." "Keep the question of 'wet' or 'dry' Lincoln out of the fight—it is but a temporary issue; don't plead the cost side, rather the service side; fight a good clean fight, that no enemies for the University may be made."
