**INTERESTING LECTURE
IN PHYSICAL SCIENCE**

Dr. Ostwald Treats of the Laws of
Dispersion and Their
Importance.

In his lecture on the physical sciences last night, Dr. Ostwald spoke on the laws of dispersion and the importance of these laws in the preparation of colloidal solutions. By means of a number of microscopic slides he showed that the size of the particles in a fluid medium would produce different colors and reflect different rays of light. All known colors exist in solutions and as the size of the particles decrease or increase, every color is revealed. Large particles produce deeper and more intense colors. The size of the particles and the shape of the crystals serve as a means of dis-

tinguishing between the various elements.
Dr. Ostwald's next lecture will be upon a method of determining the size of molecules in colloidal solutions.
