

**PHI RHO SIGMA BREAK
GROUND FOR NEW HOME**

Medical College Fraternity to Build
Fine \$15,000 Structure This
Summer.

Omaha, Neb., March 22—Ground was broken for a \$15,000 fraternity house at Forty-second and Dewey yesterday afternoon by members of Iota chapter of Phi Rho Sigma who attend the University of Nebraska College of Medicine.

The sod-turning ceremonies commemorated the thirteenth anniversary of the founding of the chapter in Omaha and the program was in charge of the following charter members: Drs. M. A. Tinley, B. W. Christie, W. P. Wherry, C. W. M. Poynter, C. F. Avery, A. H. Cooper, M. B. McDowell, S. B. Hall, H. W. Heffelfinger, A. B. Lindquist, H. A. Reichenbach.

A campaign for a house building fund was launched eighteen months ago and alumni members have guaranteed payment of the entire cost. The house is to be three stories and basement. In the basement will be game rooms, store rooms and furnace room. Living rooms will occupy the first floor, with study rooms on the second and a dormitory on the third. The house will be one of the finest fraternity homes in the west and the only University of Nebraska building owned by a professional fraternity.

A dinner at the Empress garden and a theater party at the Brandeis concluded the day's program.

Yale's Skating Rink Finished.

Yale now has for its hockey practice and games one of the largest rinks in the country. A Boston company had 125 workmen rushing to completion the rink and artificial ice plant two blocks from the Eli campus. They promised that the rink would be in readiness for the Yale-Princeton hockey game on January 28. Fully 5,000 persons will be able to see the Yale hockey games when the rink is finished, 3,200 of them furnished with seats and 1,800 with standing room. The rink will receive light through 300 windows in the day time and by twenty large arc lights in the evening, soft spots on the ice being averted by a device that allows no direct sunlight on the surface. The entire building will be of steel. The floor space is 200 by 80 feet.—Daily Californian.
