University of Minnesota. He was greeted with great interest and his lecture was interesting and witty throughout. He talked at length on the interpretation of contracts. He told of his experiences in the Philippines. He also dwelt on the form of government and the dangers of an in-

discriminate use of popular sovereignty. He explained that he was strongly opposed to judicial recall. Professor Taft is to give two more lectures, in which he will discuss how the courts' decisions have been in direct accord with the development of public opinion.
