For five weeks next summer, commencing July 6, Lincoln Fields, Ludington, Michigan, will be dotted with military tents. A thousand or more university and college men will camp there in the summer camp of the United States Government. The purpose of the camp is to give military ties have been developed-and some instruction to college men. It will be people have won lasting distinction under the personal supervision of Major F. D. Webster, commandant of cadets in the University of Illinois.

Ludington will be the camp for the middle states. Students from Illinois, Minnesota, Iowa, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Wisconsin and Nebraska will be taken. In addition to the students, there will be at least one company of regular United States infantry and a troop of cavalry from Fort Sheridan, and a battalion from Fort Snell-

Army officers have already visited most of the schools in this section getting up a bit of enthusiasm over the

project. Interest has become very keen at the University of Michigan, due to a visit paid there by Major General Leonard Wood, chief of staff of the United States army. Indications are that several hundred students will take advantage of the low rates and good time offered. The government will furnish all equipment except clothing, and the only charges will be for board.
