**WOMEN'S SHORT COURSE IN DOMESTIC SCIENCE**

**Four Day Trip to Various Towns—No Charge for Time of Professors—Thorough Lectures.**

The two following articles were taken from the extension news sheet of the Nebraska Agricultural College:  
 A women's short course in domestic science lasting four days may be obtained by the women of any community upon application to the Extension Service, University Farm, Lincoln. Two instructors are sent free of charge to give lectures and demonstrations. Actual cooking is done and a thorough study is made as to the economic value of foods, their digestibility and nutritive value. A meat-cutting demonstration is given at which a beef carcass is cut up and the various cuts explained. Home nursing, invalid cookery, breads, salads, and desserts are also treated.

Mr. Hy Cost O'Living is once more under investigation, this time from a different angle and by the University Farmers. The fact that only 46 cents of the consumer's dollar ever reaches the producer has suggested that the study of distribution is more important than production. As a result, a new course has been added in the College of Agriculture intended for the long-suffering consumer. As the town and rural inhabitants are both producers and consumers, the study promises a widespread appeal. Among the problems taken up are the home and domestic distribution of produce, wholesale and retail marketing, so-called "free delivery," parcels post, competition, and co-operation.

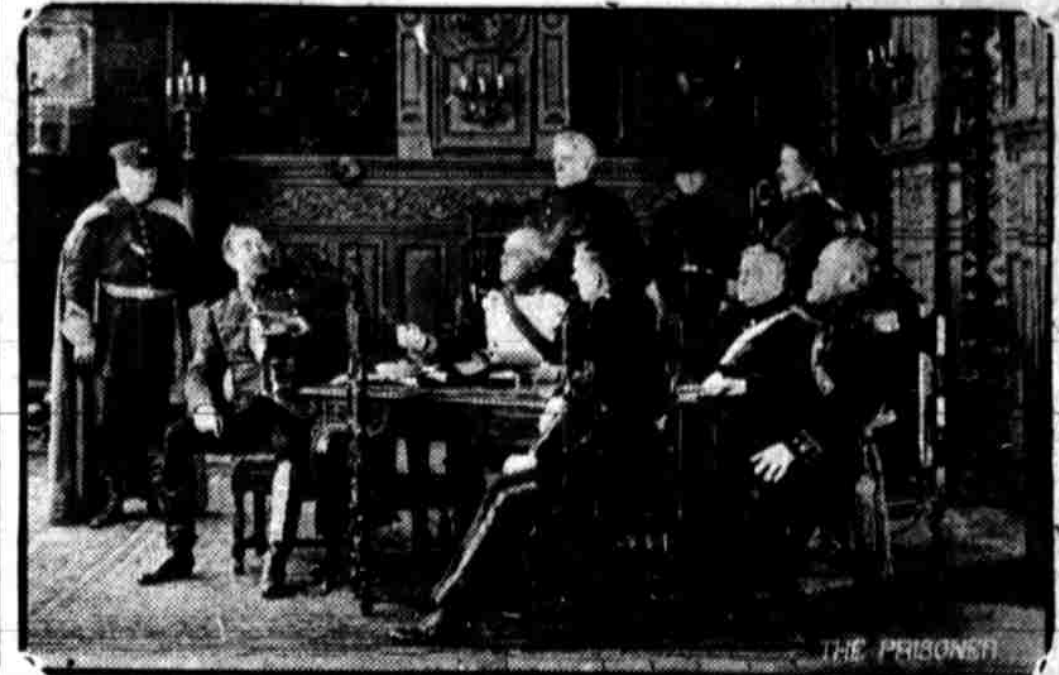
**Ames.**
