a pebble finish and will be printed on the finest enamel paper available.

This edition will sell at \$2.50, the same price as last year, despite the fact that they cost 50 cents a copy more than the standard book of last year just to print. The de luxe book, which is being introduced for the first time in Nebraska, is an elegant book, bound in red morocco and gold, with a padded cover, printed on an extra grade enamel paper with a gold top and the owner's name in gold in the right-hand corner, and a silk facing in the inside. Last year at Wisconsin the Badger sold 300 copies of this edition at \$5.00 each. The management, in order to introduce them here, are offering them for \$3.50, or about half what they cost to print and engrave.

The contract calls for 1,300 copies of both editions and when this number is sold it will be impossible to get any more at any price. Since the announcement in the Rag last week of the advance sale, orders have been pouring into the business manager's office at the rate of from fifteen to twenty-five a day, so it is very doubtful if the remaining books will last long. Business Manager Swift anticipates a shortage by the second day and advises everybody that wants a book to get them early, rather than risk a chance of not getting one at all.
