

CHINESE HOME LIFE
DESCRIBED BY TAFT

Missionaries Make Plain Conditions of Poor People in Far East—Salary Pledges Soon.

The Y. W. C. A. rooms were crowded to their full capacity Thursday night by University girls who came to hear Miss Taft's message from China.

Miss Taft opened her interesting talk by an appealing description of the pitiful conditions of Chinese home life. She stressed the fact that all individuality is crushed out of the woman, who has absolutely no opportunity to express her ideas in bringing up her children and in managing her home.

She mentioned the need of restraint given in a kindly way to these women as they gain their freedom. She said that the women of the present moment have more power than they knew how to manage. When they are led in the right way, however, and given a sense of proportion, they make excellent doctors, nurses and teachers.

Miss Taft next described the training of the young women in home economics, the cultural subjects, and even in business courses.

Miss Taft described Mr. Robertson's lecture work which is given under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. His lectures are illustrated and lead to a basis upon which he can explain the Christian religion.

In speaking of the reception which missionaries receive, she said that the Chinese women meet them more than half way and that while they are struggling with a distressing poverty, such as we can scarcely realize, they contribute liberally and gladly to the support of women who can guide the great work of the Y. W. C. A. and make it accomplish its great purpose.

Tomorrow begins the campaign for pledges to Miss King's salary. All girls are asked to come forward with their support and to join themselves to the great cause of elevating the condition of Chinese women.
