The NEBRASKAN does not wish to
be misunderstood in its attitude
towards the enlistment of University
men in the so-called Nebraska Regi-
ment of the Nebraska National Guard.
We are not attempting to persuade
anyone not to enlist. All that we wish
to do is to try to bring home to every
student just what the real issue is in
deciding whether or not to enlist. Men
who enlist are offering their services
far in advance of any national de-
mand for them. As yet, the nation has
not issued a call. Those who have
offered them in advance are—or should
be—doing this because they are an-
xious to go to war—because they are
anxious to "get in on the ground floor."

Every man has a right to choose his
own profession. If war it be, all right.
But we do not want to see anyone,
deluded by false ideas of patriotism,
sacrifice opportunities far more prom-
ising to him, in order that he may
have an opportunity to go to war be-
fore his country calls him.

National Guard companies, it is
planned, will be the first to go. The
idea is plainly to take only those men
who have signified that they wish to
follow a military career. The govern-
ment has purposely avoided calling
volunteers in order that the most
promising young men may not be
called upon to sacrifice themselves in
Mexico. We can not for the life of us
see where there is any call for Uni-
versity young men to enlist unless
they desire to follow the military pro-
fession. If this be the case, the pres-
ent opportunity is indeed a good one.
But there is no call.
