The Thetas drew the outside path and this gave Irwin a six or eight foot lead at the end of the first 220. Bates added that much more and Howard was not able to cut down the big lead. At the time of the last touch off, Zumwinkle had a good ten or twelve foot lead over Reed. As the two rounded the curve Zumwinkle seemed to be fairly flying. Reed was gaining a little, but the pace was terrific. As the two men headed down the home stretch and as they neared the tape Reed seemed to be fairly electrified and not only passed his speedy pupil, but passed him with several feet to spare. Timers say that Reed's time was under 22 seconds. But what ever put that much power in him as he neared the tape the crowd could not fathom.
