The seniors of Kansas University have chosen a stone bench as their memorial. They are also starting a tradition, that of celebrating "freshman cap night."

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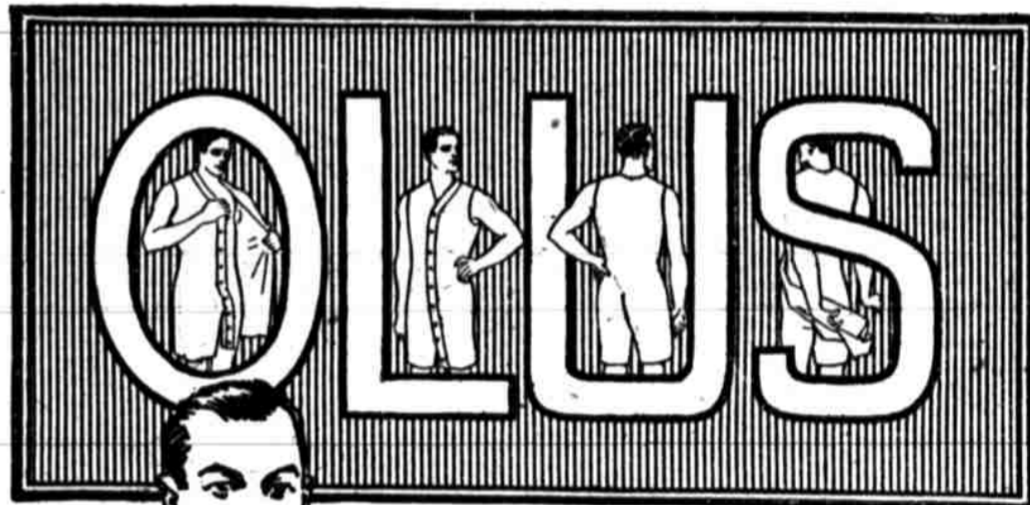
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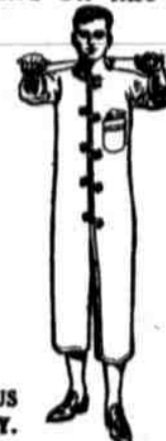
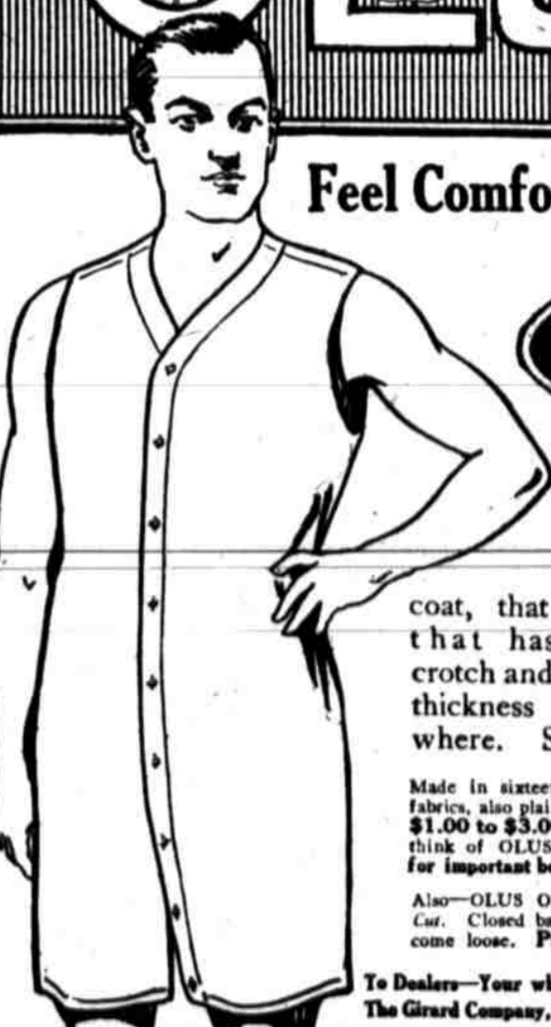
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
