HIGH SCHOOL TRACK MEN MEET ON NEBRASKA FIELD

Kansas City Manual High School Wins First Place—Lincoln Runs Third.

Saturday afternoon upon the University athletic field the Missouri Valley High School Association held its annual track meet. Only five high schools were represented, but competition was keen enough to make the meet interesting. Each race was close and run in good time, considering the fact that a twenty-mile wind swept the field, thus cutting down the time to a large extent.

Kansas City Manual High School won the meet with a total of 41 points. Kansas City Westport was second with 30½ points. Lincoln was third with a total of 21 points, nosing out St. Joseph by one point. Kansas City Central was fifth with 19½ points. In many of the events the field was simply a triangular affair between the three Kansas City high schools.

Only one record was broken and that was in the pole vault, when Winn of Manual easily cleared the bar at 11 feet 2 inches. Winn was one of the stars of the meet, amassing a total of 15 points. Castle of St. Joseph also made a mark for himself, contributing 15 points to the standing of his team. Marshall of Manual and Selbie of Westport also were heavy point winners. Marshall took first in the shot put and the discus, while Selbie won the quarter mile in the fast time of 51 4/5, coming within a fifth of a second of the record. Boulton of Manual ran a pretty mile, winning easily in 4:46 2/5.

On the whole, the meet was quite satisfactory. The crowd, however,
