Previous to his coming to America, three years ago, he was connected with the leading symphony and opera orchestras of Holland, Germany, Austria and Russia, in addition to having made several concert tours on the continent. It was shortly after his arrival in this country that he was engaged as solo 'cellist of the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra, and since then the success of his appearances as soloist with the Orchestra, during the eastern tours of both last and this year, and during last year's spring tour were little short of sensational. It was more than sensational, it was permanent, as is confirmed by the fact that every city where he appeared has tried to secure his services for a recital or concert. On three occasions when Mr. van Vliet was soloist with the Orchestra in Minneapolis this season the house has been sold out and hundreds turned away. In the case of Mr. Czerwonky,
