Miss Esther Starrett, Delta Gamma, returned to Lincoln Saturday after spending six months in Europe. She arrived in Paris shortly before war was declared and remained in the city for two weeks while mobilization was in progress. Miss Starrett said: "The experience was one that can never be forgotten. Paris was changed overnight from a mammoth city of theaters and shops, as seen by the tourist, to a city bustling with feverish preparation for war. Thousands of soldiers poured through the streets to the stations. Troops from the provinces entered the city, driving before them huge herds of cattle. Streets which a few days before had been parades for fashionably dressed men and women were used as herding places for the cattle. The theaters were

closed and many of the shops as well. All citizens who were not concerned in the work of mobilization were ordered to keep off the streets after the curfew sounded at 8 p. m. We were able to get a train to the coast finally and reached London safely. The English did not seem so excited about the war and most of the stores in London were open. The people went about the business of preparing for war

calmly, in marked contrast to the singing and excitement of the French."
