ity. He gave some interesting statistics
concerning the work and gave
some examples of the work done in
the past years. Doctor Emerson then
gave a talk on "The Relation of In-
sanity to the Medical School." This
was a very fine talk, in which the
doctor showed how this phase of
medicine was being neglected, and he
also prophesied that this would be
taken up more carefully in the near
future. Doctor Emerson was a student
at Nebraska when there were not so
many people taking the medical
course, and he expressed himself
as pleased to see so many taking up
this profession. Doctor Griffith, of
the Hospital, was next, and he lectured
on the new form of treatment
of mental diseases called "Hydro-
Therapy." He told of several recent
cases, mentioning especially the physical
benefits to be derived from this
treatment. He also told of the various
ways of treating different forms
of one kind of insanity. Dean Wolcott
next told of the new buildings
the future scientists of Nebraska were
to have, as he thought they would be.
The dean thanked Doctor Williams
and his associates for the kindness
shown the society, and the meeting
was dismissed.

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
