BY TEXAS UNI STUDENT

Subject is, "Working One's Way Through the University"—Much Like Nebraska Situation

The following article is an extract from a recent issue of the University of Texas Magazine. The title of the article written by Jesse R. Wilson is, "Working One's Way Through the University."

"Every one works his way through the University of Texas. The grind finds nothing but work. It is all work for him; it is work or 'bust,' and sometime it is work and bust. The clever student works—the 'profs.' He sometime falls, but he counts on this. If he did not fall at times, his suc-

cesses would not be half so pleasurable. The earnest and determined student with more perseverance than money, with little enough sense to believe that he can go through the University and not enough for any one to convince him that he cannot, works not alone at his studies but also at some task or tasks whereby he makes his living expenses.

"In discussing the subject, 'Working One's Way Through the University,' I shall not consider the 'grind.' Neither shall I consider the one who skims his way along. The most clever pen could not overcome the inherent monotony of the one or fully deplet the subtle cunning of the other. The student who must make that which the
