The following is cllpped from the Seattle Post-Intelligence:

The charges now hurled against him that he was the secret friend and helper of Germany, deliberately betraying his own country, are, of course, absurd. But the damage that he and others like him did their country is no absurd fiction but a deadly serious fart.
