Financial Statement issued by Dean Graham—Only One Mixer Shows Loss

Two thousand, eight hundred and forty-five was the total paid attendance at the all-University mixers, the statement of receipts and expenditures of which has just been given out. The largest paid attendance was 910 at the Home-Coming mixer.

#### Freshmen Barred from Saloons at Madison

"No Freshman is permitted to enter a saloon in the city of Madison," according to the rule passed by the Student conference.

If a Freshman is over twenty-one years a saloonkeeper cannot refuse him admittance to the saloon if he demands it, but according to the conference ruling, no Freshman, whether of age or not, shall be permitted to enter a saloon. According to the saloonkeepers they cannot help the conference enforcing the ruling legally.

Last year no complaints were entered against Freshmen for entering saloons, but in 1913 when the ruling was passed, several cases were up before the Student Court. The conference and Sophomore class are watching closely to see that the rule is not violated this year.

The penalty for those found guilty of entering is suspension from university work for a period of not less than two days nor more than two weeks for each offense.—Wisconsin State Journal.
