And the boy, sure of his mother's fairness, rushed back to deliver a message which must be heeded. Maybe she saw the question in my eyes, regarding her decision, as I volunteered some excuse for the little girl who is a great favorite of mine, for she said firmly: "Grace is just as strong as the boys she is playing with. She can count quite as well, run as fast and is just as shrewd in catching those who are hiding, but she doesn't happen to like that part of the game. South American Industry.

The sap of the sapodilla tree is very largely used in the manufacture of chewing gum. The tree is cultivated in Mexico and Central America, and the method of collecting the sap, called "chicle," is very similar to that employed in extracting maple sugar. Mexico alone in 1910 exported chicle, valued at \$170,000.

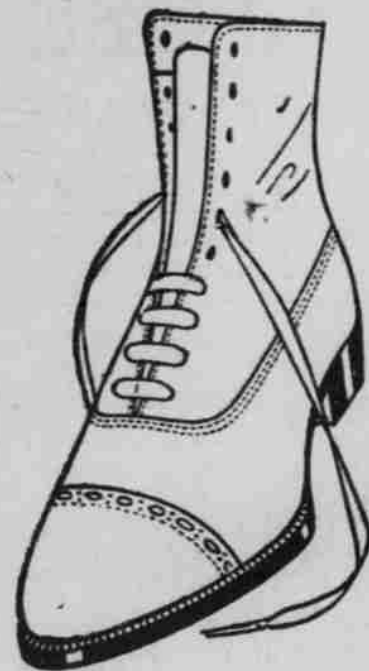
